

Lesson Plan: Nature's Palette – Exploring Art Through Colors

Nature's Palette – Exploring Art Through Colors

Duration

Learning Objectives

- Identify primary, secondary, and tertiary colors.
- Understand how colors interact and create mood in artwork.
- Create a simple nature-inspired artwork using color mixing techniques.

Materials Needed

- Color wheel (printed or digital)
- Paints (red, blue, yellow, white, and black)
- Paintbrushes and palettes
- Paper or canvas for painting
- Nature-themed image references (e.g., flowers, landscapes)

Introduction

Instruction

- Discussing Mood in Art: Explain how warm and cool colors affect the mood of a painting. Show examples of artwork to illustrate mood creation through color.

Gamification Elements

- Color Mixing Challenge: Students earn points for correctly mixing specific colors.
- Nature's Palette Game: Identify the colors and their combinations in reference images of nature.

Activities

- Color Wheel Exploration: Students use paints to create their own color wheel.

Homework/Extension

Students observe a natural scene at home (e.g., a sunset or garden) and sketch it using the color schemes they learned.

Evaluation

Review the accuracy of the color wheels and the creativity of their nature-inspired artworks.
